



#### The Pastor Ponders...

...What is the purpose of praying the Stations of the Cross?

The king will answer, "Whenever you did it for any of my people, no matter how unimportant they seemed, you did it for me." Matthew 25:40 (CEB)

Some of you may have attended a Roman Catholic Mass or participated in an event at a Catholic retreat center and noticed several crosses hung on the wall several feet apart in the worship space or located at intervals along a path outdoors. This is known as The Stations of the Cross, or the Way of the Cross, and was brought to the Vatican and to churches so that those who were unable to undertake this pilgrimage in the Holy Land could still have a meaningful spiritual experience.

Most of the time there are 14 of these "stations" scattered throughout the space, each one depicting an event that took place during Jesus' final journey to the cross. Sometimes there are scriptures or artwork hung in these locations as well. Station #1 = Pilate condemns Jesus. Station #2 = Jesus accepts his cross. Stations 3 - 10 recall other encounters and suffering. Station #11 = Jesus is nailed to the cross. Station #14 = Jesus' body is laid in the tomb.

#### The Pastor Ponders (continued)

Recently, some have updated or repurposed the "stations" to add new or a broader meaning to the practice. Some groups have chosen not to include all of the stations in their time of reflection. Participants, either individuals or a group, stop at each station to meditate and pray, thus sharing in Jesus' journey to the cross for themselves in an attempt to deepen their understanding of Jesus and their faith.

While I was serving in Villa Park, the Catholic Church hosted a walk through the village on Good Friday based on the Stations of the Cross. Folks took turns leading the procession carrying a large wooden cross. At each "station" we read a scripture verse followed by a paragraph calling folks to a particular attitude or action based on the verse. We sang a short hymn and then journeyed on. Following the last station, everyone returned to the church for a lunch of bread and soup and a time of fellowship.

One of the things I found most meaningful about this journey is that the "stations" were carefully selected to call us to prayer and action. We stopped at the Police Station, Fire Station, school, medical building, playground, War Memorial, etc. and as we read scripture and meditated on Jesus suffering, we reflected on how we could love and serve others as Jesus asked. As a community, we prayed for those who protected us, or educated us, those who were sick, those affected by violence, and we also prayed for peace. Regardless of our denomination, or some of our differences in practice, we found a way to come together and to witness to our faith.

It is good to remind ourselves from time to time that we are not the perfectly loving creatures that God intended for us to be. But it is also good to remind ourselves that, because of Jesus' life, teachings, death, and resurrection, we have the potential and the power to be better versions of ourselves than we currently are. I invite you to spend some more time during this Lenten season to reflect on how much God loves you. Read the story of Christ's suffering and death. Join with our siblings in Christ on Palm Sunday, Holy Thursday, and Good Friday worship. AND THEN, come and joyously celebrate the Easter Resurrection and New Life!


